About the NIO Killer Whale Alliance

Very little is known about the killer whales that inhabit the tropical waters of the Northern Indian Ocean.

Due to their typically offshore nature and infrequent sightings, very little is known about their ecology, movements, population structure and more...this makes them some of the most mysterious cetaceans in the world.

The Northern Indian Ocean Killer Whale Alliance was founded as part of a collaborative project between Orca Project Sri Lanka, a Citizen Science study of killer whales seen off Sri Lanka, and Wildlife Conservation Society biologist Tim Collins, with the hopes of shedding some light on the lives of these mysterious whales. In addition to coordinating a Photo ID catalogue for the region and developing a general repository of sighting records, the alliance was set up with the objective of increasing the number of "eyes and ears" available in the area for killer whale sightings. Membership includes individuals and organizations from a wide range of backgrounds including marine research, tourism and recreation.

Together we learn more

Although sightings are sparse they can be far more informative when they are shared and compared. In addition to this PDF, a live online version the catalogue can also be found on the NIOKWA website under the 'ID Catalogue' tab. All images contributed are fully credited to their photographer(s), observers and/or study.

While only in the early stages, this ocean-wide collaborative effort bears the support of over 30 individuals and 19 organizations. We predict that in time this project may reveal some of the secrets of the whales in this region, including insights into their site fidelity, diet, movements between countries, population sizes and maybe even ecotypes.

Northern Indian Ocean Killer Whale ID Catalogue About:

Identification Methods:

This catalogue uses the tears, nicks and scars found on the dorsal fin as the primary method to identify individuals.


Saddle Patch Pigmentation:

The saddle patch is the grey saddle-shaped area at the base of a killer whale's dorsal fin. It is typically used as a feature for identification in the study of other killer whales, particularly in those from cold and temperate waters. However, killer whales in the tropics tend to have a saddle patch that is too faint to be a reliable feature for ID. Visibility and degree of shading does tend to vary from animal to animal and pod to pod, with some individuals having no visible patch while others' are clear enough to see unique contrasting scars. In the cases where an individual's saddle patch is clear enough to be used in identification, the image has been cropped to include it.

Limitations of opportunistic data:


Many of the encounters with these elusive, pelagic killer whales were opportunistic. Please understand that image quality and availability varies. For this catalogue, we have used just one side of the dorsal fin that best shows the overall silhouette. The killer whales are catalogued into pods, but in some cases not all of the pod was photographed, or photographed with a quality suitable for ID. At the top of each pod listing, an approximate number of animals sighted during that encounter has been given. This is based on either details provided by the observer or the number of distinguishable individuals present in photographs and/or footage.






